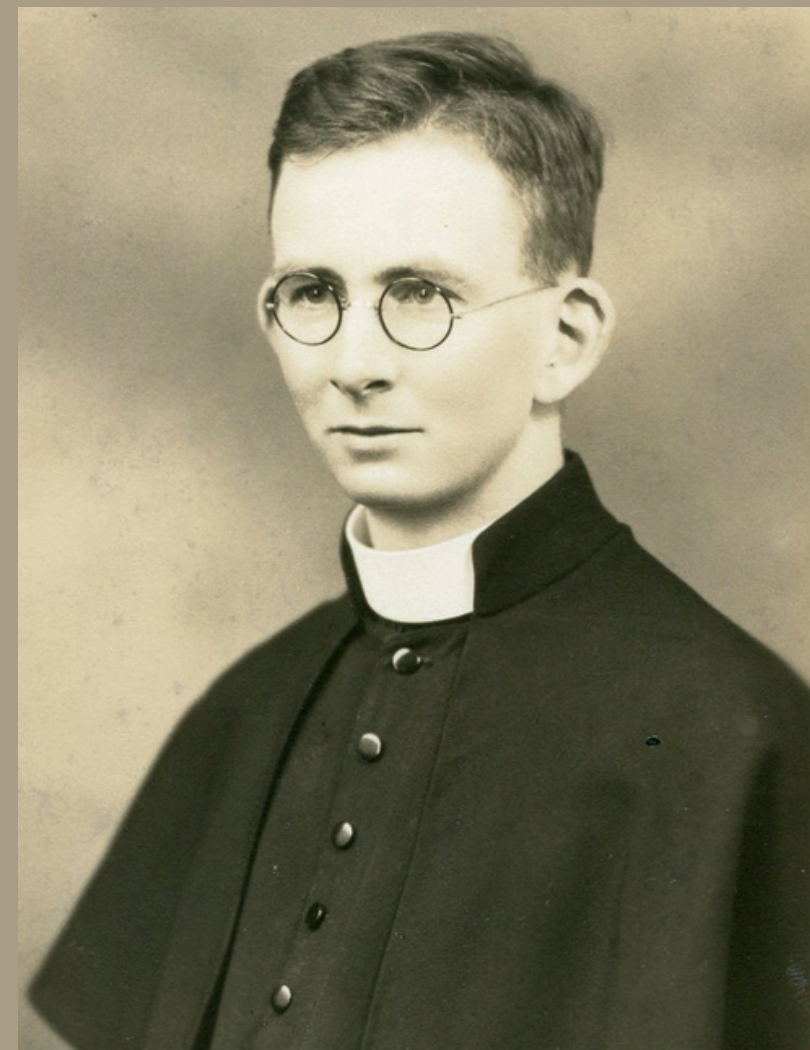

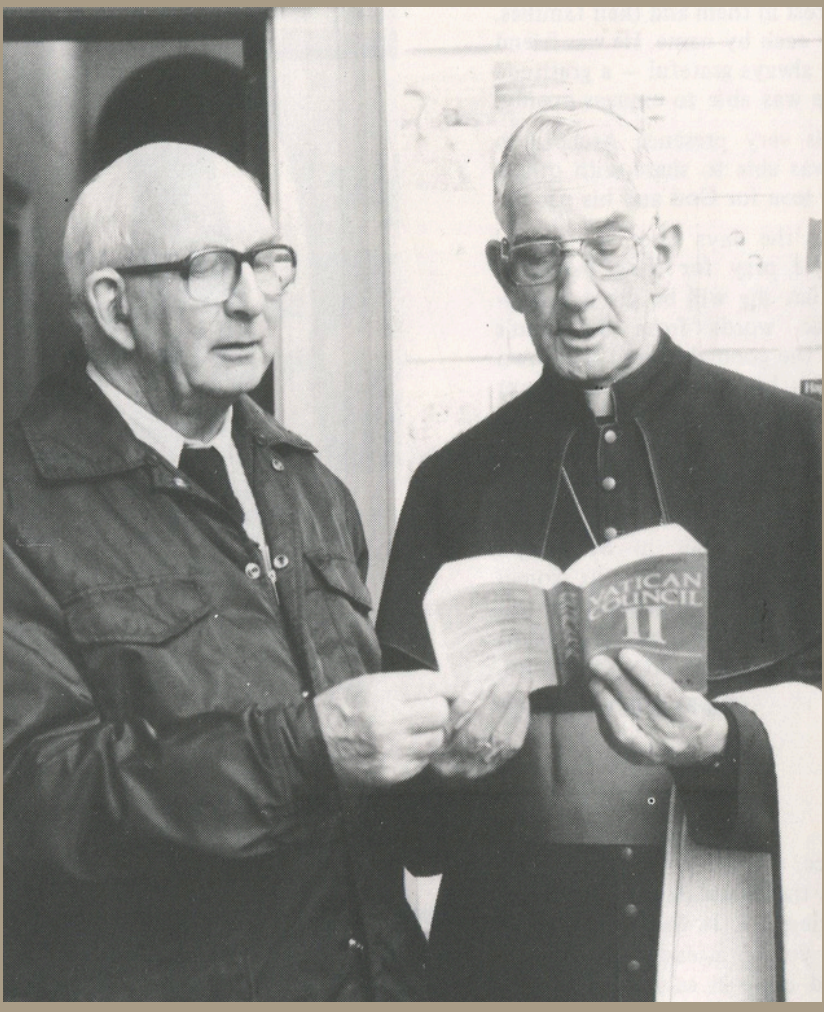

Fr John Corcoran Wallis

1910–2001

Fr John Corcoran Wallis was a pastoral priest of the Archdiocese of Hobart, visionary founder of the Missionary Sisters of Service, and a man deeply committed to bringing hope, friendship and the Gospel to people on the margins.

Born in Homewood, in the parish of Yea, Victoria, he was educated at Homewood State School, Sacred Heart School Yea and Assumption College Kilmore before studying for the priesthood at Springwood and Manly in NSW. He was ordained in 1932 for the Archdiocese of Hobart.

Throughout his priesthood, Fr John served as parish assistant, relieving priest, parish priest and chaplain across Tasmania, including Launceston, Hobart Cathedral Parish and Bruny Island, Burnie, Invermay, Westbury, Glenorchy, Warrane, Lindisfarne, Taroon and Bellerive. He also served as chaplain at Calvary Hospital Hobart and later resided at Mary's Grange.

He was Vicar for Religious of Tasmania, established the Catholic Provident Fund, and founded a Catholic library and bookshop in Hobart. He helped establish churches at Glenorchy, Claremont, Chigwell and Warrane, and invited the Dominican Sisters from Sydney to assist with the new Catholic school at Glenorchy.

A gifted spiritual director and retreat leader, Fr John guided many religious congregations and lay groups, particularly in the years following the Second Vatican Council. Ahead of his time in pastoral outreach and lay ministry, he was passionate about bringing the Church into the “highways and byways” of Australia.

In 1944, Fr John founded the Missionary Sisters of Service, initially known as the Home Missionary Sisters of Our Lady. He remained a companion, friend and spiritual guide to the Sisters throughout his life, until his death in 2001.
